- These horses are not wild as they did not naturally live in the area that they do now, so are not wild, but are no longer tame, either. This includes such horses as Mustangs and Brumbies.
- a three-beat gait of the horse where legs on opposite sides and leading strike the ground at the same time. Faster than the trot and slower than the gallop.
- a young, uncastrated male horse between the ages of birth and 4 years.
- Any type of equidite; horses, ponies, donkies, mules.
- a horse of chestnut coat with black points. Horses of this color may be split into catagories: blood bay, golden bay, dun (if applies), etc.
- English sturrops
- an indoor box where a horse is kept at times during the day. What your truck does on the way to a horse show, fifty miles from the closest town.
- A way of exercising a horse, using a lunge line that is attached to the horse's halter. The horse moves in circles around the trainer, who stands in the middle holding the lunge line.
- a horse with large splashes of any color and white. Hairs are not combined as with roans, but instead keep seperate with their own colors.
- a palomino-colored horse (tan or gold) with black points.

- a young female horse who has not yet had a foal between the ages of birth and 4 years.
- an adult female horse over the ages of 4 years or after she has had her first foal.
- a horse who is between 1 and 2 years old.
- term describes the action of examining a horse's teeth to determine it's age.
- The rider of a racehorse.
- a stallion used for breeding.
